<i>An ophthalmologist achieving this level will, in addition:</i>	
Independently assess and manage moderate complexity patients, demonstrating an understanding of procedures for paediatric conditions selecting the most appropriate treatment according to current accepted practice.	<ul style="list-style-type: none">▪ Understand and apply knowledge of medicine and surgery relevant to paediatric ophthalmology practice, to make diagnoses and recommend management plans.▪ Be informed by the patient's unique medical, educational, psychological and social circumstances.▪ Use the indirect ophthalmoscope with appropriate indentation technique.▪ Understand the tests and imaging techniques that might be helpful in deciding about and guiding treatment, including alternative approaches to visual assessment in children who are unable to engage with formal acuity testing.▪ Be able to interpret findings from a functional visual assessment and use them in formulating a diagnosis of brain related visual problems/cerebral visual impairment. ▪ Implement a detailed management plan to include care from triage to discharge from care.▪ Use with accuracy and efficiency instruments available to assess the patient, including optometric and orthoptic equipment, ultrasound and specially designed paediatric equipment.▪ Have a good knowledge of the complexities of prescribing glasses in children – including those with hypoaccomodation – and prescribe as appropriate from a cycloplegic and subjective refraction.▪ Acknowledge and follow relevant guidelines and protocols.▪ Practise in line with the latest evidence.▪ Involve the patient, their carers and relatives in the choices about their care and enable them to express their informed consent where possible.▪ Share decision-making by providing appropriate and comprehensible information, prioritising the patient's and family's wishes and respecting their beliefs, concerns and expectations.▪ Communicate the uncertainty of options in a manner that patients will understand.▪ Enable self-management where possible.

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Understand and apply knowledge of clinical genetics relevant to paediatric conditions. ▪ Advise patients and families about patterns of inheritance if they request to know, and recognise when it is appropriate to refer a patient for genetic counselling. ▪ Understand the indications, risks and limitations of conservative, medical, optical and surgical treatments and identify patients for whom these treatments would be appropriate. ▪ Recognise when a patient has had or is developing a complication or side effect from treatment and be able to manage this in an appropriate and timely manner. ▪ Maintain an understanding of new developments in relevant technologies.
<p>Risk assess and prioritise patients appropriately, recognising the need for special interest input.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Manage patient referrals efficiently, according appropriate priority to referrals based on clinical need and in accordance with local and national guidelines. ▪ Refer to more experienced clinicians when appropriate. ▪ Manage acute presentations following local guidance. ▪ Know when assessment by a specialist ophthalmology team is more appropriate for the child than staying with general paediatric ophthalmology, and refer as appropriate. ▪ Know the conditions that warrant an urgent onward referral to other healthcare professionals, and be aware of the local policies and systems for making such referrals. ▪ Manage surgical waiting lists and other access to clinical services appropriately, intervening when clinical care for a patient is put at risk by inappropriate waiting list management.
<p>Independently perform low complexity extraocular paediatric procedures.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Perform a competent Retinopathy of Prematurity (ROP) examination, assessing the stage, documenting findings and referring appropriately. ▪ Perform an examination for ophthalmic signs of non-accidental injury with accurate recording of the findings. ▪ Perform and record the findings of an examination under anaesthetic on a child, including refraction. ▪ Perform uncomplicated recess or resect procedures on an unoperated horizontal rectus muscle. ▪ Perform uncomplicated lacrimal probing procedures. ▪ Develop new skills in a supervised simulated environment.
